"Roadside" Reviewed

Again play time has come and gone, and a production at the capable hands of Mr. Joe Newman has passed us by; but like all of his productions, it has left its mark on everyone who participated and those who viewed it.

The one thing that struck us odd this year was that in the length of time he has been directing and producing in the boothel area. Mr. Newman has kept a pattern of plays in that he has done a comedy and a drama in the lapse of his

producing year. This year, due to his viewing audience and their demands, Mr. Newman kept both plays at a mellow television type show without the usual hidden story or dramatic story line that he has been proven to direct so well. Thus another comedy.

"Roadside" in itself is truly one of the funniest reading plays we have had the privilege to read, in that playwright Lynn Riggs created certain characters and gave them true-to-life situations that made the play. 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Junior-Senior Prom Policy

The following recommendations are made by the Prom Committee:

1. A limit of \$4.00 per student (including the combined membership of the juniors and senior classes) must be set for the dance. This would establish a definite budgetary procedure for future proms.

2. Eligibility for Prom attendance:

A. All juniors and seniors of Kennett High School, in good standing, will automatically receive formal invitations.

B. Any junior or senior from Kennett High School may invite, as his date another KHS student (grades 9-12).

C. Any junior or senior from Kennett High School may invite a student in good standing from another high school as his date.

D. Students who have attended KHS in the last two years may be invited as dates. This means that college students or others not presently enrolled in school will not be eligible unless they have attended KHS during the past two years.

E. All outside guests must be registered in advance in the principal's office. High School students from other schools must be registered along with the names of the principals of the schools they attend.

3. Students and their guests will not be permitted to leave the gym and re-enter the Prom.

Smoking will be permitted only in the lobby area of the gymnasium.

4. The Band for the Prom should be of good repute and a quality to insure the display of good manners and tasteful actions from students and guests.

5. Parents and friends of KHS juniors and seniors will be invited to take pictures or see decorations during a set time; however, parents will not be invited to come and go throughout the evening.

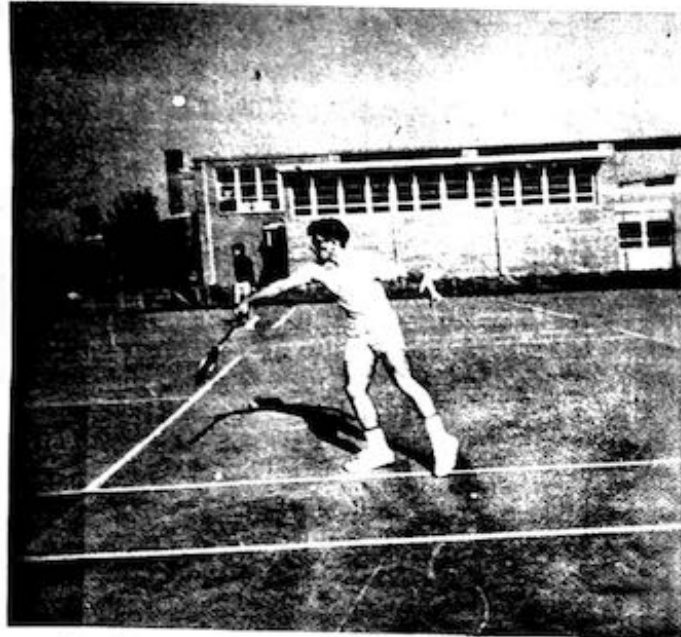


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Breck Bartness shows his skill in returning at tennis practice.
