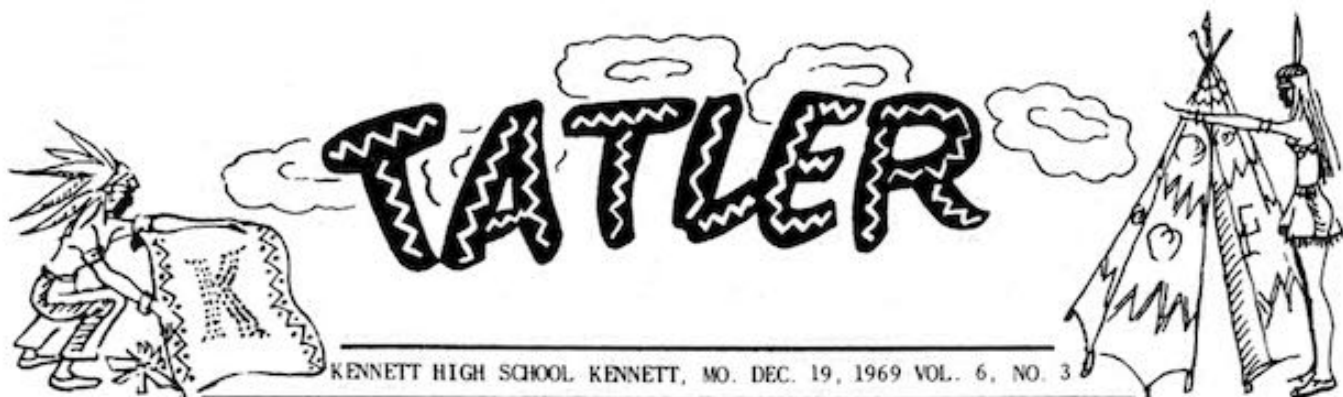

We are a government by the people, of the people, and FOR the people.

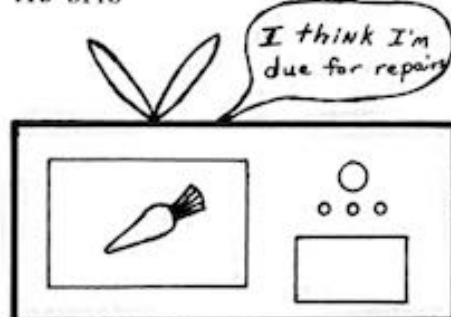

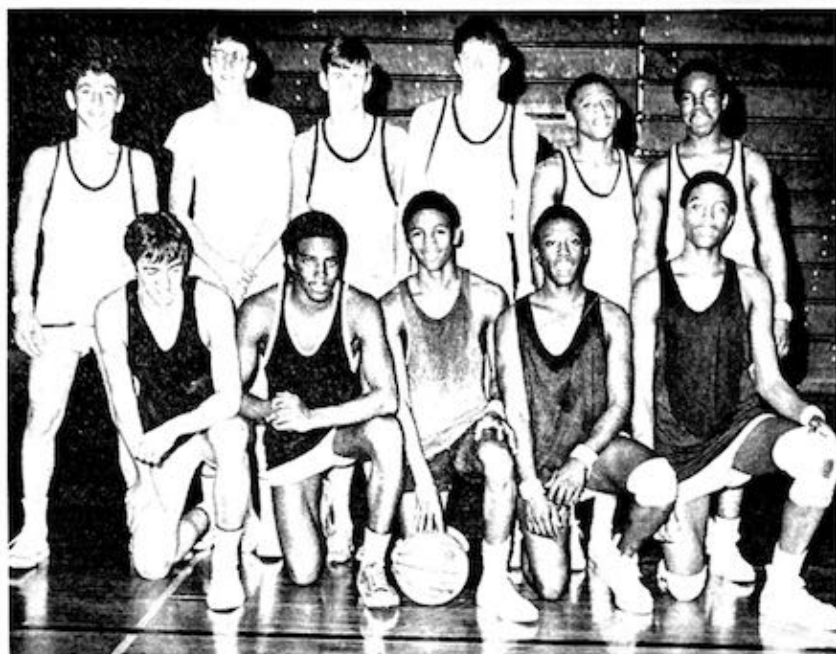

INDIANS DEFEATED BY CARUTHERSVILLE IN FINAL FOOTBALL GAME

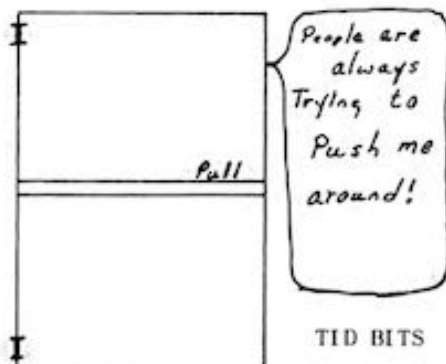

Field goal percentages were poor with a 33% overall average. Free throws were considerably better with a 65% clip. The 25 fouls were the downfall by which North Pemiscott collected 33 points in free throws 20 of them in the first half.

Larry Robinson collected 23 points and 15 rebounds to lead Kennett in both departments. John McNally was second in scoring with 14 points. Doug Gilmer was runner up in rebounds with eight even though he fouled out midway in the 4th quarter.

The B-teamers won their opener, however, 49-39. Ricky Ford and Bob Plumley were top scorers with 15 points each, and Ricky Ford led in rebounds with 15 while Plumley was second with 11.
