From Africa

This is another in a series of letters from Bill Gish, who is in Libya, Africa.

"On the evening of December 20, I caught a flight to Cairo with some friends from here. We arrived there near midnight. By the time we

cleared Customs and Immigration, it was almost 2:00 a. m., so we checked into the Nile Hilton.

The next morning, we hired a guide through the hotel, and he was responsible for our Cairo Adventures. He took

us first to the Great Pyramid and Sphinx at Giza on the outskirts of the city, where we literally crawled through the second largest pyramid. The passages were so narrow that once we had to back down on our hands and knees, but it was worth all the discomfort...the ancient Egyptians' knowledge of structure is fantastic. We then rented camels and rode around the Sphinx--great fun.

We spent the next two days sightseeing and shopping, visiting a perfumery, the Citadel (an enormous mosque built by Suleiman), the Egyptian Museum which houses King Tut's treasure, the native market area where we almost ran into a riot, an Egyptian restaurant for a delicious meal, and a nightclub in the desert. We also saw the "Sound and Light" production at the pyramids where the story of Ancient Egypt is told using colored lights on the various monuments...really spectacular.

On December 23, we flew to Luxor, a lovely village on the Nile, and we toured the nearby Valley of the Kings. These tombs are remarkable. The hieroglyphical drawings of the Pharaohs' lives are still intact, bright, and colorful.

We also saw the Valley of the Queens, went to an alabaster factory, which in reality was just a hut, and visited the Temples of Karnak and Luxor. The weather was delightful

there...warm and sunny; we even went swimming on Christmas Eve Day. The people were quite friendly in Luxor and we rented bicycles and rode all one afternoon through the narrow streets of the town.

On Christmas Day, we flew to Aswan in hopes of seeing the High Dam there, but security is so intense that we didn't have time to process the necessary papers. Instead we rented a felucca (a sleek, narrow sailboat) and had two Nubian boys sail us up and down the Nile, stopping wherever we light to sightsee.... places such as the mausoleum of the Aga Khan, Elephantine Island, Kitchener Island, and the Temple of Philae. The weather here was fine also, but the people are somewhat hostile; and I can understand why. They live under a great deal of pressure, because if the Arab-Israeli War should start again, Aswan Dam would probably be a major target of attack. The tension here is such that there are armed guards on the streets, and it is a very uncomfortable feeling to realize one is generally unwelcome in a place.

We had a little trouble leaving Aswan because terrible sandstorms forced the closing of the Cairo airport, and they could not send a plane for us. But the weather finally cleared, we made it back to Cairo airport, and they could not

A slow start, an unlimited amount of fouls and a poor team effort by the KHS varsity Indians resulted in a 57-45 defeat by the Perryville Pirates. The Indians now hold a 2-2 conference mark and a 10-5 overall record. The B-Indians posted a 49-39 victory over the B-Pirates, giving Kennett a split in the nights action.

Kennett dropped behind after the first period, 19-12 and 32-22 at halftime but fought in the third quarter, pulling within four points of the Pirates. Bad passes, floor mistakes, and personal fouls gave the Pirates all the brakes they needed for their fourth quarter win.

Randy Fingers scored 29 points in leading the KHS Indians to their 11th victory of the season, Tuesday, February 12, by downing Corning, Arkansas with the score of 88-60. The B-Indians in a somewhat closer game defeated Corning's B-team, 49-35.

The tribe played well considering the change in the change in the lineup with the absence of starter Ed McKinney and the reserves made up for loss with fine performances. Larry Robinson and Randy Fingers dominated the boards, hauling a good share of the rebounds.

The Indians led 23-11 after the first period with Fingers and Robinson coupling for 15 points in the second quarter, giving Kennett a 43-27 halftime edge. Fingers continued

to pace the scoring in the third frame with fine performances from the Kennett reserve.

Jim Callawaert tossed in four and Don Denham collected seven points and nine rebounds in the final quarter. Tom Miles and Gaylon Rodgers joined in the fourth quarter scoring collecting two and seven points respectively. Starter Jackie Mullins scored six points and starter Charlie Brooks poured in nine points. Alternate starter Graham Burcham, although scoring only two points, turned in a fine defensive performance.
