EXCELLENT PERFORMANCE FOR "ROADSIDE"



Covered wagons, cowboys, farmers, marshals, fist fights, and country courtrooms all provide the setting and mood for Lynn Riggs' three-act play, "Roadside", which will be presented at Kennett High School March 27, 28, and 29.

Riggs stretches the imagination, but is able to maintain continuity and a fast moving story line. The play may be classified as a comedy or a misty-eye romance, but it seems to have something of interest for everyone who views it.

In this world of art, Riggs has drawn a character of self-assurance and heroism into this stage production.

Tim Brown, in his portrayal of Texas, beats judges, tears up courtrooms, and makes hash of the town of Verdigrée, all for the sake of the voluptuous, strapping Hattie Rader. Hattie, portrayed by Jan Miltenberger, twists Mr. Texas around her finger. She is able to inflate or deflate his morale and "knock the wind plum outa him." Riggs uses these two to give his views on the nature, lawlessness, love, and

the world in general.

In the town of Verdigrée, there lives a marshal, portrayed by Sid Jones, who feels that it's his duty to arrest Texas even if it means "gettin shot." Neb Winters, played by Billy Keating, the guard and jail-keeper who wants to stay as far from Mr. Texas as possible; the judge, played by David Ross, who feels that everyone is against him; and Mrs. Foster, portrayed by Sherry Hamilton, a nosy, little lady who wrecks the trail. Then there is Buzzy Hale, the old "buzzard" who turns over his friends for the sake of Hattie. This amusingly jealous character is portrayed by Barney Greenway. Red Ike and Black Ike, portrayed by Raymond Sellers and Terry Myers, are simple characters, not quite good and not quite bad. And last, but not least, there is Pap Rader, a pessimistic old man, portrayed by Ben Jordan.

This stage production will be presented in the KHS auditorium. Tickets may be purchased from any member of the cast or crew.

Mrs. Brown was born in Malden, but says she has spent most of her life in Piggott---where she attended school. The Browns came from Piggott two years ago to live in Kennett.

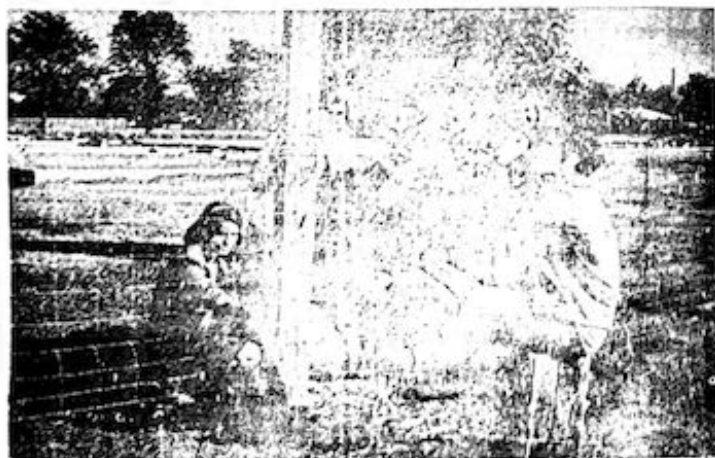
When asked her first impression on the high school, Mrs. Brown said "I'm having trouble

Five KHS senior girls will travel to Europe this summer. They are: Judy Simcoke, Betty Ann Robinson, Charky Brown, Marcie Duncan, and Sheila Gatewood. Martha Downing, a senior at Malden High School, will accompany them. They will be sponsored by Mrs. Helen Wall, KHS English and publications instructor.

The girls will depart from New York by jet on June 16. They will spend six days in Rome; five days in Leysin, Switzerland, Neubeuern, and Germany; five days in Paris; five days in Amsterdam; six days in London; and eight days on board a ship.

Participants will spend a minimum of one-hundred hours in the classroom. One-fourth of the time will be devoted to special interest and round table discussion groups

with European Students.

The girls will be housed in various and sundry hotels, dormitories, residence halls, and castles. They will be able to take excursions to such places as the Baths of Caracalla, the Castle of Chillon, Zermatt and the Matterhorn, Versailles, the Eiffel Tower, Windsor Castle and Runnymede, Pompeii, and Tivoli.

The Comparative Governments and Cultures program will introduce the students to the historical background, social institutions, current problems, and cultural contributions of Western Europe. 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CINDERMEN QUALIFY 12 FOR STATE INDOOR TRACK MEET

Spring is here, and with Spring comes the beginning of Track and Field.

The KHS Cindermen kicked off the season with the qualifying Indoor Meet held in the Kennett stadium Wednesday, March 19.

The Indians managed to qualify 12 men for the State Indoor to be held March 29 at Columbia, Mo. There were many standouts for the Tribe as Greg Buys set a new KHS shot put record with a throw of 60 feet 1 inch. Another standout was Bruce Colyott, who qualified in the low hurdles (7.7), high hurdles (7.8), broad jump, and ran the second leg of the 880 relay. Along with Colyott on the relay were Tommy Powell, Graham Burcham, and Mike Hunter.

Jim Callewaert surprised even himself when he leaped a n astonishing 21 feet 11 inches in the broad jump. Gayon Rogers and Bobby Sullinger proved to be the standouts in the pole vault as Rogers took first with a vault of 12 feet 6 inches and Sullinger placed second with a leap of 12 feet.

In the 60 yard dash, Kennett's Robert Shepard ran a 6.5 to qualify him behind the time of 6.4 by Pensel of Cape Girardeau.

David Bruce, running a hard race in the mile, came in second behind Leach of Poplar Bluff with a good time of 4:39.

The Indians also made a good showing in the mile relay as Phillip Greenway, Graham

Burcham, Tommy Powell and Mike Hunter finished the race under the qualifying time.

Indians Take Loss 54-47

The KHS varsity Indians, who have a chance to stay in the upper half of the SeMo conference standings, were defeated in a crucial conference ballgame by the Dexter Bearcats, 54-47, Friday, Feb. 21. In the opening game the B-Indians lost 61-39.

The Indians dropped behind 12-8 after the first period and 26-19 at halftime. In the third quarter the Indians put together a quarter of top notch ball coupled with a wholesome team effort which lifted Kennett into a 37-31 lead as the quarter ended. The Indian's third quarter efforts seemed to be in vain as Dexter surged from behind in the fourth quarter with a 23-point final drive to defeat the Indians.

Center Larry Robinson turned in a stunning defensive performance and led the tribe's scoring with 16 points. Jackie Mullins collected 12 and Randy Fingers ripped in 11. Robinson and Fingers topped the tribe's board crew, pulling down 12 and 10 respectively. The Indian's record now stands

The Kennett High School basketball team completed their 1968-69 season, Tuesday, March 4, at the Class L Regional tournament, losing to the Charleston Blue Jay 59-54, despite a spectacular performance by Senior Randy Fingers who put together the highest individual scoring out of the week with 29 points.

Kennett had trouble finding the range and only hit a cool 38 per cent in the opening half. The Indians trailed early in the first quarter and never led despite a strong final period. Fingers ripped in key buckets all night, with a three-point play in the third frame this brought the Indians within

one point of the Jays 30-29. However, before the quarter ended the Jays increased their lead to 40-34.

Randy Fingers led the tribesmen in every department, hauling in 16 rebounds to add with his 29 points. Junior Larry Robinson, a fine prospect for next year, collected 9 of the Tribe's 44 rebounds. The loss left the Indians with an 11-9 seasonal record.

Randy Fingers and Larry Robinson poured in 17 and 16 points respectively with Charlie Brooks collecting 14, to spark the Indian's come-from-behind second half bid, only to lose by a couple of last minute goals.

The B-Teamers, led by Bobby Sullinger, were plagued

by technical and personal fouls which eliminated all but three starters before the final buzzer sounded. The B-Indians gave the visiting B-Bluejays a 11 they could handle before losing only by one point. The tribe traveled to Cape Girardeau, Friday, February 28, to play their last scheduled game before the Regional Tournament at Sikeston, Missouri.
