KHS Stokers Finish Fifth In District Match

Although the Kennett High School golfers have had a below average season, they surprised everyone as they took fifth place in the district golf match Monday, May 5, held at Westwood Hills Country Club in Poplar Bluff. The tribe was among eleven teams competing for state bertha as Kennett ranked in last place.

The "Hot club" for the Indians was held by Ronnie Wilcoxson who paced Kennett with a seven over par 79. This placed Wilcoxson seventh in the competition. Right behind Wilcoxson came Jim Pruett with an eight over par 80 placing them eighth among the 53 golfers.

Sikeston has dominated the district the past three years, but fell off the pace as Rodney Shell, ranked fourth among Cape Central's team, took individual medalist trophy with a stunning three over par 75 to pace Central to first place, one stroke ahead of Sikeston, 315-316.

Rusty Ridge of Poplar Bluff was nipped by one stroke, 76, to take second place medalist. Bluff's team total was 323 to give them third place.

Wilcoxson scored the lowest margin recorded for the tribe this season as he turned in a

38 on the first nine holes. At this point, he was in a two-way tie for first. It seemed he was to finish "in the money" until the 15th hole where his chances were spoiled when he shot a bogie (one over par) to set him behind the leaders. He went on to compile three straight pars to finish out his 18 hole round. Supported by sophomore Mike Zimmerman and Junior John McAnally who finished the day placing 29th and 34th with scores of 89 and 92, the team total came to a respectable 340 giving them a fifth place finish. This was surely the best showing for the Indians this year.

Sikeston failed to make it to the state competition because in order to send two teams from any given area, there must be at least 12 teams entered in their district.

This has been a rebuilding year for the K. H. S. golfers, and next season should prove to be much better. With the exception of the graduation of Senior ace stoker, Jim Pruett, returning lettermen include Juniors, Wilcoxson, Mike Zimmerman, Lee Middlesworth, Tim Hall, Sophomore Jeff Pylant, and Senior John McAnally.

Buy's Makes State Champion At District Meet

On Friday, May 9, the KHS track team traveled to Sikeston for the District Meet. Although only taking third place in team standing, the Tribesmen made a fine individual showing led by state shot and discus champ Greg Buys.

Others making an outstanding performance were Jim Callewaert, with a 21' 7" long jump and David Bruce, who won the two-mile run in record time. Both Callewaert and Bruce qualified for the state meet, along with Buys, Gaylon Rogers and Graham Burcham, who qualified in the 220.

These five boys will now prepare for the State Meet at Columbia, May 17, where led by returning champion Greg Buys, they expect to make a fine showing.

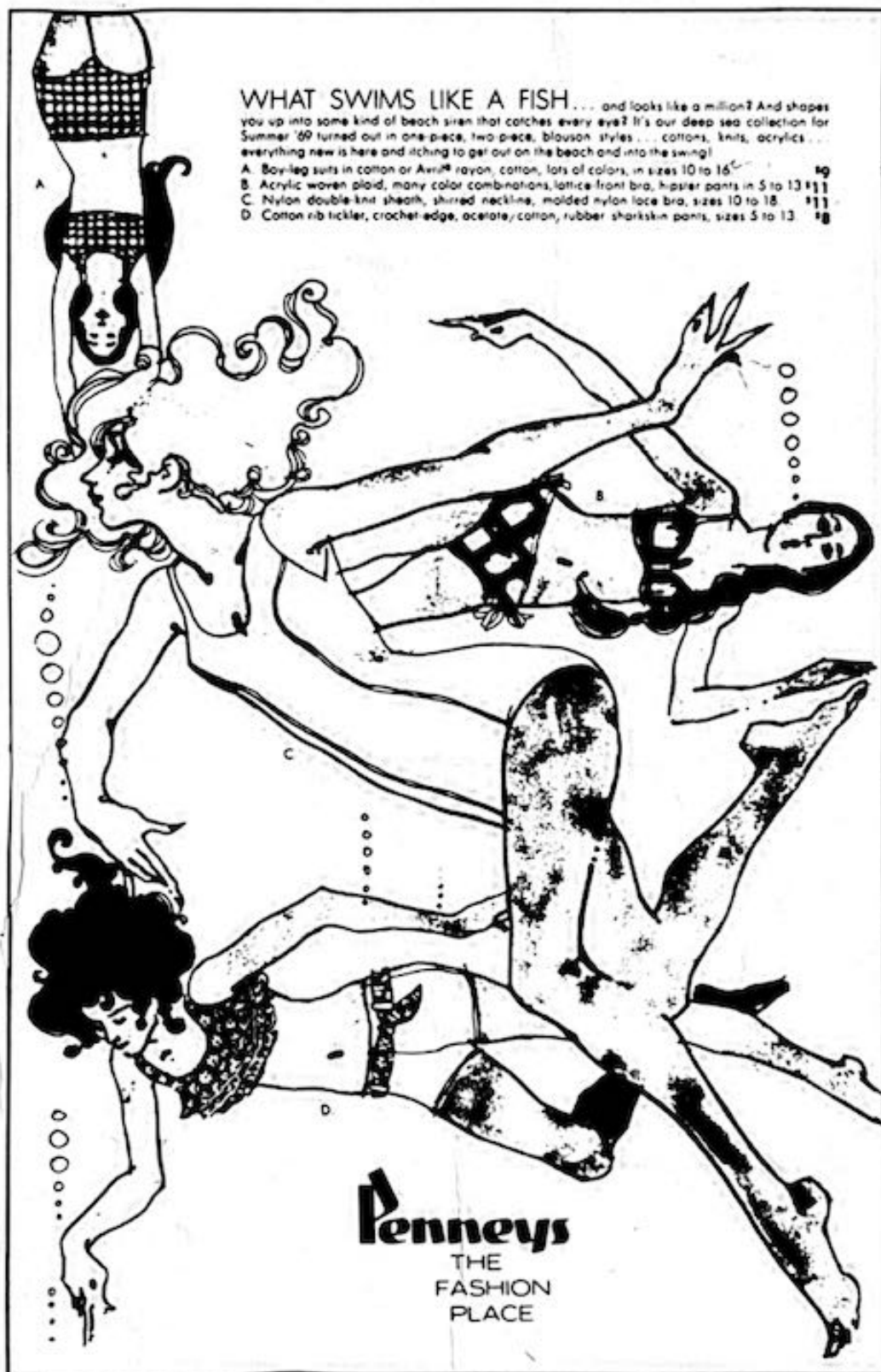
