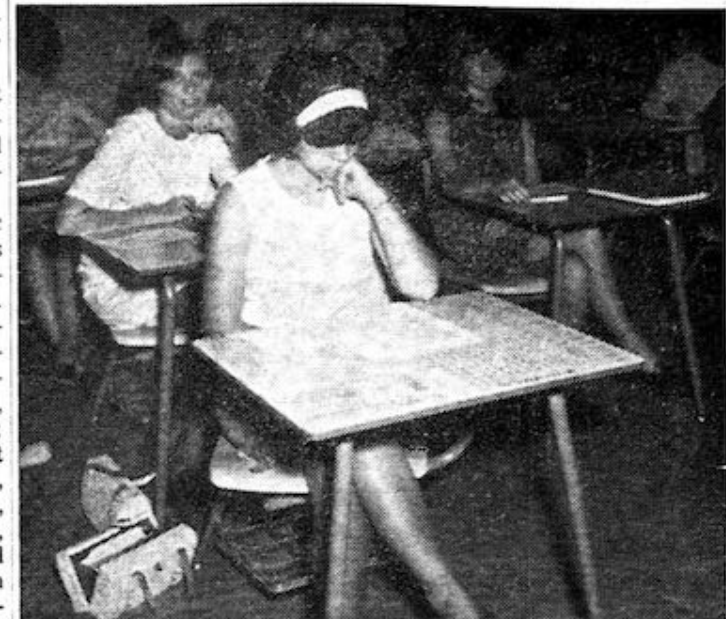

MORRIS HUFFSTUTLER (Jr.) — I think it's great.

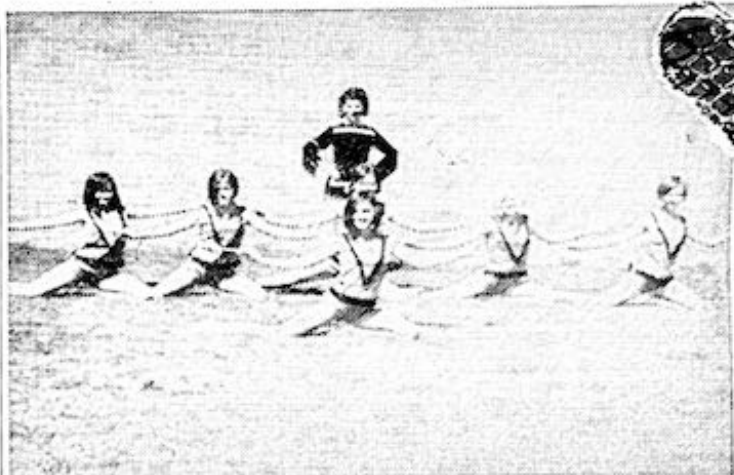
ARLICE HELTON (Jr.) — I guess it's OK; I'll live with it.

"I can't wait to go back! It was great!" These were the only replies Judy Simcoke could use to describe her summers stay in Sweden.

Judy left Memphis, Tenn. on June 16, and traveled by jet to Detroit, Mich. From Detroit she went along with 123 other American students to Copenhagen, Denmark. There the students split and went to meet their Swedish families. Judy and ten other students, traveled by train to Goteberg, Sweden, the second largest city in Sweden. There, Judy was greeted by Mr. and Mrs. Celander and their children, Goron 17, Stellan 15, and Katarina 10. This was to be Judy's "second" family for the rest of the summer. "Everyone was so nice, they respected Americans a great deal."

Judy had a slight advantage over the other travelers. Mr. and Mrs. Celander lived in New York City in 1945. "They all could speak English very well, except for Katarina." Judy took many small trips to the surrounding countries. "A mile seems much farther than it does to us, and they can't drive until they're eighteen!"

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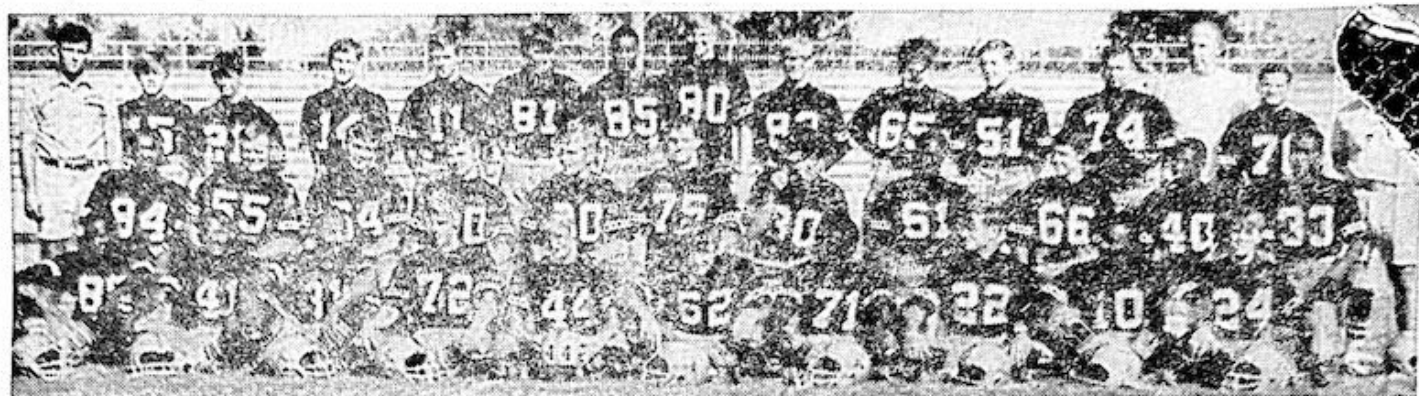
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Indians Take Green Wave 24-13 in Season Opener

A near capacity crowd watched as the Kennett Indians beat the visiting Malden Green Wave 24-13.

The Indians started fast after kicking off. The first play Malden ran, their speedy half-back, Clayton, had the ball knocked loose and Dennis Oakley pounced on it for the Indians.

Four plays later the Tribe had a six-pointer, but the extra point was wide.

Malden's first score came with 6:42 remaining in the second period. On a first and ten play Gary Blaylock hit Don Clayton for an 80-yard touchdown pass.

The Wave scored again late in the second period with Roy Holt picking off a McKinney pass and racing 72 yards to

score, but this was nullified by a clipping penalty. This left the score standing 6-6 at half-time.

The Indians scored again late in the third quarter with McKinney racing 11 yards to the end zone.

The tribe started another touchdown drive early in the fourth quarter, rolling 62 yards in nine plays, with David Collins carrying it in from the five. Again the extra point attempt was wide making the score, 18-6.

After intercepting a Malden pass and taking over on the Tribe 21, the Indians marched 59 yards in five plays with McKinney scoring on a 25-yard end run. Again the extra point attempt failed making the score 24-6.

With less than a minute to play, Clayton scored on a 62-yard run in which he showed his great speed. Terry Clayton, his younger brother, ran the extra point.

The game ended 24-13 for a Tribe victory and 1-0 season record.

The next score was in the fourth period on a 24-yard run which tied the score 13-13, but the conversion was bad.

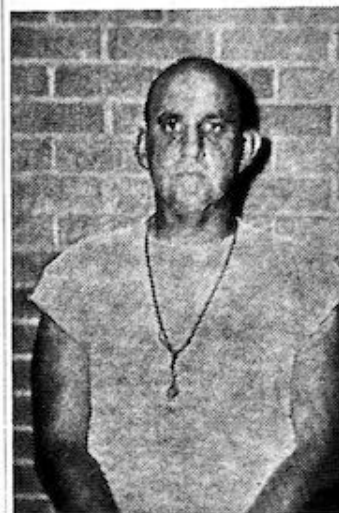
Other offensive stand-outs were Randy Fingers, a full-back, and Charlie Brooks, half-back.
